## **LAMAS DE MOURO** - PARADA DO MONTE

### **HIKING & DISCOVERING**

This route goes from Lamas de Mouro to Parada do

In some points, it follows the course of the Mouro River, a tributary of the Minho River which markedly models the configuration of the terrain. The waterline path is predefined by the direction of the main fractures affecting the granite massif.

Shortly after passing the ruins of the Old Castro Laboreiro Dog kennel, cross the paved road and follow the dirt path that leads you close to the left bank of the Mouro River. A few metres away, cross the Medoira Bridge (A), in Porto-Travassos, over the river with the same name, leading to Brandas De Travassos (about 1.2 km from the route) and Fitoiro, located at 950 and 900 metres altitude, respectively. These were used in the summer (June-August) for cattle grazing, due to the lack of food in the village since the fields were totally cultivated. Both tell the story of the Parada do Monte people and how they organized themselves as a community, adapting to the environment, basing their subsistence model on agriculture.

When crossing Branda do Fitoiro (B) you follow the dirt path, with a small detour along the old sidewalk, to Cortegada. After a few metres of tarmac, turn right next to the water line, a vital structure for

the conduction of water for irrigation. The water is used both in winter, in level irrigation, avoiding the damage to the marsh caused by severe frosts and low temperatures, and between June and October in the irrigation of maize fields or to move the mills.

At the end of Abelheira waterline (C) the path goes to the village of Parada do Monte and ends next to Saint Jerome Alminhas (Shrine) (D) which are the most emblematic of the parish. They are carved in a kind of altar attached to the wall of a house which was executed in carved granite by master Manuel José Gomes (S. Paio, Melgaço, 1825-1901), better known at the time as "Mestre do Regueiro".

Fauna: Roe deer (Capreolus capreolus), hoopoe (Upupa epops), black kite (Milvus migrans)





#### Flora:

Chestnut (Castanea sativa), butcher's broom (Ruscus aculeatus), royal fern (Osmunda regalis)


## TRAIL SIGNPOSTING
