







HIKING & DISCOVERING

This trail leads you through a pleasant route along the Laboreiro River, which springs in the plateau of Castro Laboreiro, on the western slope of the Laboreiro mountain range, near the Galician border, and crosses the entire territory. As it turns south, the river sets the border between the Peneda and Laboreiro mountain ranges. In its final section, of about 14 Km, it also sets the border between Portugal and Spain and flows into the Lima River.

The route starts in the village of Castro Laboreiro, and, shortly after, you will be at the interpretation centre. Then, you will reach a natural viewpoint to the Laboreiro waterfalls and the village's old bridge. In this mountain area, the waterfall crosses a steep slope and falls from the top of high rocky cliffs. Involved in this landscape, you can also appreciate the old water mills used in the past to grind rye, the essential raw material in the making of rye bread, the famous "castrejo" bread.

Winding down the mountain, the Laboreiro banks are connected by bridges that various civilizations have built over time and are still standing today. In the final stretch of the route, you can cross Varziela Bridge (C). Of the numerous historical bridges that are preserved, Varziela is the one that presents the

greatest traces of the medieval period. However, some authors point out the medieval redesign of ancient Roman bridges, which would also have happened to this bridge.

These are some examples of the inexhaustible opportunities that the Laboreiro River has to offer. Throughout its extension it presents us with clear natural pools surrounded by giant cliffs and breathtaking waterfalls, the perfect ingredients to practice canyoning (D), a recreational exploration activity that allows us to visit and go through the most beautiful and hidden corners of this mountain river.

Fauna: otter (lutra lutra), Pyrenean desman (Galemys pyrenaicus), river trout (salmo truta fario)





Flora: common alder (alnus glutinosa), alpine ragwort (senecio nemorensis), giant heath (zz)









Wear sensible clothes and shoes: mountain boots, a hat and a raincoat.

When there is high or very high risk of wildfires, access might be limited.




Beware of cattle. Do not approach litters or cubs
